





What is the origin of Valentine's Day? Is it biblical?

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Valentine's Day, observed February 14th widely across the globe, is characterized by expressions of love, affection and romance.

The roots of St. Valentine's Day are pagan in their original form and may lie in the ancient Roman fertility festival of Lupercalia, which was celebrated on February 15th. For 800 years, the Romans had dedicated this day to Faunus, the Roman god of agriculture and the fertility god Lupercus. On this day, young bachelors would draw the name of a young woman in a lottery and would then keep the woman as a companion for the year. These matches often ended in marriage.

Some claim that the Christian church may have decided to associate the death or burial of St. Valentine, a Roman priest that was martyred around 270 CE, with the middle of February in an effort to "Christianize" the pagan celebration of Lupercalia.

The details of Saint Valentinus of Rome's life are shrouded in legend, with multiple accounts attributing acts of compassion and defiance to him. In fact, there are several Roman Catholic Saints that carry the same name along with several stories about who Saint Valentine was.

Likely, he was a Christian leader or priest who lived in ancient Rome during the 3rd century. At that time, Emperor Claudius II was determined to eradicate Christianity from his empire and so he began putting to death highly visible and important Christian leaders. One such leader was Father Valentine. Emperor Claudius II had also banned marriage to prevent men from refusing to go to war. Father Valentine, however, secretly continued to marry couples.



The emperor seized Valentine, beat him, and threw him in jail. During his trial, he was asked about what he thought of the Roman gods Jupiter and Mercury. He responded that Jesus Christ was the one and only true God. The emperor said to Valentine: "Either renounce the Lord Jesus in front of all the people or be executed." Valentine refused to deny his faith.

On February 14th, soldiers came to take Valentine to be put to death by beheading. According to some stories, before his execution Valentine wrote a letter to a young girl he had befriended. The woman he fell in love with was possibly the jailer's blind daughter, whom it is thought he also healed. Some accounts say it was a letter, others say it was a piece of paper torn into the shape of a heart, but the signature said "From your Valentine".

Years later, the Roman Catholic Church made Valentine a saint and dedicated February 14th as a time to remember this Christian who was willing to die for his love of Jesus. It's easy for us to praise the Lord and attend church on Sunday, but if we were tested in this way, would we stand firm for Christ?

While the Bible doesn't have any specific messages about Valentine's Day, it does have a lot to say about love since "love" is mentioned in the Bible over 759 times in the New Living Translation (KJV-442 times; NASB-479; ESV-684; NIV-686).

There are many "love" stories in the Bible - the story of Adam and Eve, who had the first romance. The story of Abraham and Sarah, from whose love there arose a whole nation. There is the story of Rebekah and Isaac, who exemplify faithfulness. What about the story of Ruth and Boaz whose love began as a business deal and ended like a fairy tale. There is the story of Hosea and Gomer, whose love was adorned with both grace and forgiveness. But of all the love stories in the Bible, the best may be the love story of Jacob and Rachel.

The Bible tells us that when Rachel died Jacob buried her in a place called Ephrath. Years later, there was born in that same place, the mightiest descendant of Jacob and Rachel. Ephrath is the Old Testament name for Bethlehem. And the mightiest descendant of Jacob and Rachel was named Jesus. The most beautiful thing of all about the enduring love of Jacob and Rachel may be that out of their love came the One whose love would save the world.

That's a love story worth remembering on this St. Valentine's Day.

While the holiday has undergone secularization over time, its origins in Christian martyrdom and acts of love align with broader spiritual themes of compassion, selflessness, and devotion. For some, Valentine's Day serves as a reminder of the importance of love in both human relationships and spiritual practice.



A LOOK BEHIND THE "SCENES"

Are you interested in the technical side of things happening at St. Peter's? Do you know that the congregation has a <u>website</u>, <u>Facebook Page</u>, and a <u>YouTube</u> channel? Ever wonder how the video material gets created?

The next time you are at a church service, take a look up on the balcony. Most likely you will see sound technician Margus Jukkum behind a large computer soundboard adjusting dials and flipping and sliding switches.



We are beyond fortunate to have Margus volunteering his talents to St. Peter's. Did you know that Margus has a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Film/Cinema/Video Studies from York University and has worked as a Sound Recordist for film and television at numerous companies all around the world? In fact, he is one of Canada's leading sound recordists for film and television having worked on projects for international clients such as the CBC, BBC, Discovery, PBS, ZDF, NHK, and many others,

In 2013 Margus won a Canadian Screen Award for the Best Sound in an Information/Documentary Program or Series for History Television's Museum Secrets, Episode: The Imperial War Museum in London, England.

During services Margus sometimes relies on help from his wife Marika Kull who is a retired pharmacist and others, including Allan Meiusi. From an audio/video perspective the services and concerts are an evolving work in progress trying to unobtrusively cover the vast area of the nave, more particularly the sanctuary, so not only can the parishioners in the pews distinctly hear, but also the audio in the video releases is audible.



It is Margus who sets up the microphones at the front of the church and adjusts and monitors their volume during services to ensure that music, readings, and the sermon is well-recorded and the sound well modulated.

For special services and occasions, Tauno Mölder, Maimu Mölder and others have assisted.

Tauno's first introduction to video production happened about 25 years ago when EWR's late editor-in-chief Vaado Sarapuu needed a volunteer to man a second video camera during a community event at the Estonian House. The camera's footage ended up mostly in trash, but the foundation was laid, and Tauno has since produced numerous videos of community events corporate promos; and conducted in -camera interviews with community leaders, artists, politicians, prime ministers and presidents. Tauno's help is particularly valuable with special events taking place at St. Peter's, such as with Easter and Christmas services, visiting choirs or most recently, with the introduction and ordination of our new deacon/diakon Karl Paju. Tauno's volunteer activities are a welcome break from his day job. He is a Chemical Engineer and works for the world's largest integrated wax producer.



The more camera angles there are, the more polished and rich a video can be produced ensuring all angles are covered. Tiiu Roiser can be seen videotaping from the floor to get more of those close-up shots and acting as a back-up for sound and video. With several camera angles and sound options, most of every service has been well-captured.

Next comes the editing process, where the sound, video recordings, and photos are edited together to make a final video product. The best video and sound clips are reviewed, the sound checked, and the best video angles and sound clips chosen, edited together, and photographs, titles, and credits added to create a seamless final product to archive our congregation's history. Editing is done by Tauno Mölder when posted to the EWR website, or Tiiu Roiser when posted to the church YouTube channel.



Next, the video is rendered, compressed, and uploaded to the congregation's YouTube channel www.youtube.com/@eelktorontopeetrikogudus8966 where it goes through a copyright check. YouTube is stringent with what music it allows to be uploaded. Once the music is approved, the video is rendered to high definition, and a link created.

Our YouTube channel has videos dating as far back as 2020. Posting to YouTube became popular during Covid whereby congregants could participate in church services from the safety of their homes. With our congregation spread throughout the world, it is now a platform for everyone to access services, no matter where they live.

As the officer cuffed the man to take him in, he asked the burglar, "Why did you just stand there? All the old lady did was yell a scripture to you."


